Pursuant to the Commission's Notice of Commission Decision To Hold a Public Hearing on the Issues of Remedy and the Public Interest (Feb. 9, 2007), Cellco Partnership d/b/a Verizon Wireless ("Verizon Wireless") respectfully requests the opportunity to appear at the Commission hearing scheduled for March 21, 2007.

Attached is a synopsis of the presentation Verizon Wireless seeks permission to make to the Commission, including a description of the witness testimony that Verizon Wireless intends to introduce. As set forth more fully in the attached synopsis, Verizon Wireless seeks to address a range of pertinent issues, including the EV-DO wireless broadband technology that would be affected by the proposed exclusion order; Verizon Wireless's deployment of EV-DO technology in its multi-billion dollar wireless network; and the serious negative consequences of the proposed order for Verizon Wireless's network and device-planning strategies, consumers, and the public safety infrastructure.

Because of the breadth of these issues, as well as their importance to the public, Verizon Wireless, and its customers, we respectfully request that Verizon

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

SYNOPSIS OF VERIZON WIRELESS'S PRESENTATION FOR MARCH 21, 2007 HEARING

Judge Bullock properly recommended that the Commission should not enter an order excluding EV-DO-capable handsets from importation into the United States. Such an order would cripple the most advanced and most widely deployed wireless broadband technology in the United States. It would be extremely harmful to consumers and other businesses that depend on the currently robust market for wireless broadband. It would also have serious impact on public safety infrastructure that depends on EV-DO.

Verizon Wireless plans to present testimony from the following three witnesses:

- **Richard Lynch, Executive Vice President and Chief Technical Officer of Verizon Wireless.** Mr. Lynch will testify regarding the capabilities of EV-DO technology and about Verizon Wireless's investment in EV-DO technology. Mr. Lynch will explain that a decision to ban importation of EV-DO-capable handsets into the United States will have serious consequences to Verizon Wireless's capital spending, technology development, and business plans for using EV-DO-compatible handsets on its network to obtain voice and data services. Mr. Lynch will also testify to the harmful effect that the proposed order would have on consumers and competition in the wireless market.
- **Rosemary Garavaglia, Executive Director – Marketing of Verizon Wireless.** Ms. Garavaglia will testify regarding the process for developing devices for use on Verizon Wireless's network. Ms. Garavaglia will explain that the exclusion order sought by Broadcom would substantially set back Verizon Wireless's device-planning process, and cause harm to consumers and competition.
- **Katherine Greene, Regional President for the Houston/Gulf Coast Region.** Ms. Greene was responsible for coordinating Verizon Wireless's response to Hurricanes Katrina and Rita. She will testify regarding the critical role that EV-DO-capable devices and services played in the response to Hurricane Katrina, where Verizon Wireless's broadband network often offered the only reliable means of communication and was critical to the coordination of numerous emergency response efforts.
