The Tariff Schedules of the United States Annotated (1987) (TSUSA-1987) is the 18th edition of a compilation published pursuant to section 201, Tariff Classification Act of 1962, 1/ embracing the legal text of the Tariff Schedules of the United States, as amended and modified, together with statistical annotations formulated pursuant to section 484(e), Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. 1484(e)). 2/

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1/ "Sec. 201. The Commission is authorized to issue at appropriate intervals, and to keep up to date, a publication containing current tariff schedules and related matters, including such matters as may be needed for reporting statistics." The first edition (1963) consisted of the original publication and five supplements; the second edition (1965) consisted of the original publication and nine supplements; the third edition (1968) consisted of the original publication and two supplements; the fourth edition (1969) consisted of the original publication and three supplements; the fifth edition (1970) consisted of the original publication and four supplements; the sixth edition (1971) consisted of the original publication and five supplements; the seventh edition (1972) consisted of the original publication and nine supplements; the eighth edition (1975) consisted of the original publication and two supplements; the ninth edition (1976) consisted of the original publication and seven supplements; the tenth edition (1978) consisted of the original publication and five supplements; the eleventh edition (1980) consisted of the original publication and three supplements; the twelfth edition (1981) consisted of the original publication and two supplements; the thirteenth edition (1982) consisted of the original publication and two supplements; the fourteenth edition (1983) consisted of the original publication and two supplements; the fifteenth edition (1984) consisted of the original publication and three supplements; the sixteenth edition (1985) consisted of the original publication and three supplements; and the seventeenth edition (1986) consisted of the original publication and one supplement.

2/ Sec. 484(e), as amended, reads as follows:

"(e) Statistical Enumeration.--The Secretary of the Treasury, the Secretary of Commerce, and the United States International Trade Commission are authorized and directed to establish from time to time for statistical purposes and enumeration of articles in such detail as in their judgement may be necessary, comprehending all merchandise imported into the United States and exported from the United States, and shall seek, in conjunction with statistical programs for domestic production and programs for achieving international harmonization of trade statistics, to establish the comparability thereof with such enumeration of articles. All import entries and export declarations shall include or have attached thereto an accurate statement specifying, in terms of such detailed enumeration, the kinds and quantities of all merchandise imported and exported and the value of the total quantity of each kind of article."

The principal changes in this edition reflect (1) supplement I to the 17th edition (1986); (2) the eighth stage duty reductions that become effective January 1, 1987, pursuant to concessions granted by the United States in the Tokyo round of trade agreements (Pres. Proc. No. 4707, as amended); (3) the eighth-stage duty reductions that become effective January 1, 1987, pursuant to concessions granted by the United States in a trade agreement with Indonesia, Trinidad and Tobago, and the countries forming the Cartagena Agreement (Pres. Proc. No. 4711); (4) the eighth-stage duty reductions that become effective January 1, 1987, pursuant to the agreement on implementation of article VII of the General Agreement of Tariffs and Trade (the Customs Valuation Code) (Pres. Proc. No. 4768 as amended); (5) the sixth-stage duty reductions that become effective January 1, 1987, pursuant to concessions granted by the United States in a trade agreement with Taiwan (Pres. Proc. No. 4980); (6) the third-stage duty reductions that became effective January 1, 1987, pursuant to concession granted by the United States in a trade agreement with Israel (Pres. Proc. No. 5365); (7) statistical annotations, effective January 1, 1987, (formulated pursuant to sec. 484(e), Tariff Act of 1930); and (8) Bureau of the Census changes in Schedule C-I (Classifications of country designations) and Schedule D (U.S. customs districts and ports for U.S. foreign-trade statistics).

The statistical annotations contained in the TSUSA prescribe the statistical information to be supplied on customs entry and withdrawal forms with respect to articles imported into the customs territory of the United States. Thus, this publication is designed to enable importers, customs brokers, customs officers, and other interested persons to determine (1) the classifications and rates of duty applicable to imported articles and (2) the requirements for reporting statistical data with respect to such imports.

Such requests should precisely indicate the nature of each desired change and give detailed reasons in support of the request.

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
