**MEMORANDUM ON PROPOSED TARIFF LEGISLATION  
of the 109<sup>th</sup> Congress<sup>1</sup>**

**Bill No. and sponsor:** S. 3127 (Mr. Patrick J. Leahy of Vermont)

**Proponent name, location:** SnowSports Industries America, McLean, VA

**Other bills on product (109<sup>th</sup> Congress only):** None.

**Nature of bill:** Temporary duty suspension through December 31, 2009.

**Retroactive effect:** None.

**Suggested article description(s) for enactment (including appropriate HTS subheading(s)):**

Women's or girls' waterproof or water resistant ski/snowboard pants of man-made fibers, the foregoing having an outer surface impregnated, coated, covered or laminated with rubber or plastics material which completely obscures the underlying fabric (provided for in subheading 6210.50.30).

**Product information, including uses/applications and source(s) of imports:**

According to the proponent, the products of interest are waterproof or water-resistant<sup>3</sup> ski or snowboard pants, rather than pants styled to look like ski or snowboard wear. Ski or snowboard pants are ankle-length pants of synthetic textile fabrics coated with a rubber or plastics waterproof or water-resistant material. These pants may be made with or without insulation for cold weather protection; with pockets (at least one of which has a zippered or hook and loop closure), sealed seams at the front (up to the zipper or other means of closure) and back rise, and hidden leg sleeves with a means of tightening at the ankle; and with one or more of the following: side openings, scuff guards or reinforcement in the seat. A sealed seam is one that has been taped, glued, bonded, cemented, fused or otherwise closed so that air and water cannot pass through.<sup>4</sup> These products are primarily imported from Bangladesh, Hong Kong, Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, Vietnam and China.

Mr. LEAHY introduced the following bill; which was read twice and referred to the Committee on Finance

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## A BILL

To suspend temporarily the duty on ski and snowboard pants.

1 *Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-*  
2 *tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,*

3 **SECTION 1. SKI AND SNOWBOARD PANTS.**

4 (a) IN GENERAL.—Subchapter II of chapter 99 of  
5 the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States is  
6 amended by inserting in numerical sequence the following  
7 new heading:

“	9902.62.04	Ski/snowboard pants (provided for in subheading 6210.50.50) .....	Free	No change	No change	On or before 12/31/2009	”.
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8 (b) EFFECTIVE DATE.—The amendment made by  
9 subsection (a) applies to goods entered, or withdrawn from

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- 1 warehouse for consumption, on or after the 15th day after
- 2 the date of the enactment of this Act.

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
