### FOREWORD

This document constitutes part V of the Tariff Commission's report on the operation of the trade agreements program prepared in fulfillment of a directive of the President to the Tariff Commission under Executive Order 9832. Under this order the Tariff Commission is required to submit to the President and to the Congress at least once each year a report on this subject.

This report reviews the operation of the trade agreements program from its initiation on June 12, 1934, to April 1948. It covers all trade agreements completed during that period, including the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade entered into at Geneva, Switzerland, October 30, 1947. It does not take account of certain developments since April, such as the renewal in June 1948 of the Trade Agreements Act with amendments. Nor does it take into account certain changes in the general provisions of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade which were made at the Conference held in Habana, Cuba, from November 21, 1947, to March 24, 1948.

With a view to assisting Members of Congress who had before them the question of extending the Trade Agreements Act, the Tariff Commission issued a preliminary draft of this report in April 1948. It was necessary as of that time to issue the report in preliminary form mainly owing to the fact that it was impossible to complete before that date a detailed analysis of the concessions received by the United States in the Geneva agreement. That analysis has since been completed.

### Introduction

Part V presents statistics of United States exports and imports which have some bearing on the problem of determining the effects of the trade agreements program on United States trade. The material consists chiefly of detailed statistical tables. Three summary tables derived from these have been included in part I (Summary) of this report (see section on effects of trade agreements on United States trade and industry, tables 7-9), and the conclusions which may be derived from the statistics are discussed in the Summary.

Briefly, the analysis of causal factors in part I indicates that it is impossible from the trade statistics to trace the effects on either United States imports or United States exports, during the war and postwar years, of the concessions granted, or received, by the United States in the trade agreements. During those periods other causes have been much more powerful than rates of duty in determining both the aggregate trade and the trade in individual commodities; only for the trade agreements entered into two or more years before the beginning of the war is it possible to judge, therefore, even approximately, the effects of concessions on the volume of trade in either direction. For this reason the only statistical comparisons presented are those between certain periods of years preceding 1935 for total trade by countries -- or preceding 1936 for trade in individual commodities—and subsequent periods preceding the war, 1937-38 or 1937-39. Even for these comparisons, other causal factors, taken together, were more important than the trade agreements in bringing about the general increase, in both imports and exports, in the trade with the agreement countries between the earlier and the later periods.

Notwithstanding these limitations on the use of trade statistics to determine the effects of trade-agreement concessions on United States imports and exports, it will be of convenience to present continuous annual statistics of the imports from and exports to each of the trade-agreement countries, together with similar data for the principal countries with which the United States has no trade agreement at present. For comparison with these statistics by individual countries, summary tables of the total trade of the United States are presented, as well as a table comparing the total trade with all trade-agreement countries with the trade with all non-trade-agreement countries.

### Description of tables

Total United States trade.—Table 1 shows, for the years 1929-47, the total imports for consumption into the United States, distinguishing dutiable and free, the total domestic exports, and the ratio of imports to exports. Table 2 supplements table 1 by showing, for the war and postwar years, the imports of articles otherwise dutiable which entered free as an act of international courtesy or as emergency Government purchases of war materials and supplies, and also by showing those exports which went to the Allied Nations under lend-lease. In certain years both these special free imports and the lend-lease exports constituted a large proportion of the total trade. It is, therefore, evident that during the war years the normal factors affecting both import and export trade were greatly overshadowed by abnormal factors.

Even before the war there were marked variations from year to year in the value of both imports and exports and in the ratio of imports to exports. These variations were attributable largely to changes in industrial activity and national income, which affected greatly both the quantities and the prices of import and export commodities. The important effect of price changes is brought out by table 3, which consists of indices of quantity, unit value, and total value of exports and imports.

The lowest point in import trade was reached in 1932, when the imports were less than one-third as great as in 1929 in value. The index of average unit values of imports (table 3) had fallen by 50 percent between these 2 years (87 in 1929 and 43 in 1932); the quantitative decline in imports was about 40 percent. Between 1932 and 1937, the peak year in value of imports during the 1930's, imports increased about 130 percent in value, the unit value index rising about 40 percent and the quantity index about 65 percent. Imports declined sharply both in quantity and in unit value in 1938, but increased considerably in quantity and slightly in unit value in 1939, the last prewar year.

During the decade preceding the war, exports roughly paralleled imports in trend, although they showed somewhat less marked recovery after the depression. As the result of differences in the movements of imports and of exports, the ratio of imports to exports reached the peak of 100 percent in 1936 and fell to a low point of 64 percent in 1938 (table 1).

In the summary of this report (part I, p. 46 ff.) there is a discussion of the causes of the large increase in exports and the abnormally wide excess of exports over imports during the postwar period compared with the prewar years.

Table 1 also shows the proportion of total imports consisting of dutiable articles. This proportion changes considerably between 1929 and 1939, but during the war years, taken together, it was roughly the same as the average for the preceding decade, notwithstanding the large duty-free entries in certain years of articles ordinarily subject to duty. The causes of the changes in the proportion of dutiable to total imports have been complex. Transfers from the free to the dutiable list by the Tariff Act of 1930 and by the subsequent revenue acts (especially that of 1932, which made copper, petroleum, and coal taxable 1/2) were a factor. The extent to which a transfer from the free to the dutiable list tends to add to the proportion of dutiable goods in total imports, however, depends on the magnitude of the repressive effect, if any, of the new duty. Other important factors affecting the proportion of imports subject to duty are changes in the relative demand for different classes of imported goods, especially as influenced by the ups and downs of the business cycle, and differences between free and dutiable articles as regards price movements. During 1929-39 the lowest proportion of dutiable to total imports was 33 percent in 1930; the highest proportion, 42.9 percent, was in 1936.

Trade with agreement and non-trade-agreement countries as groups.—Table 4 shows for each year 1929-47 the total trade of the United States with all the countries with which it now has trade agreements compared with the trade with all non-trade-agreement countries. The statistics on trade with agreement countries in a given year do not relate to the countries with which trade agreements were in effect at that time; they relate to all the countries with which agreements are now in effect. The agreements have entered into effect in various years from 1934 to 1948. Obviously the effects of the operation of trade agreements can in no way be traced from these statistics.

The trade of the United States in both directions with the countries with which it now has agreements has at all times been much larger than the trade with the present nonagreement countries. For imports, however, the difference has been much more conspicuous during and since the war than before it. The war shut off imports from such countries as Germany, Japan, and Italy, with which no agreements are in effect, and those countries have not since the war recovered their prewar share of United States import trade. The comparatively large share of the export trade going to nonagreement countries during the war was due largely to lend-lease shipments to the Soviet Union. Since the war, relief shipments to various nonagreement countries have been an important factor. In all recent years the ratio of imports to exports has been much smaller for trade with the present nonagreement countries than for trade with the present agreement countries.

Trade with individual agreement countries. - Tables 5 and 6 show for each year since 1929 the trade with the individual countries with which the United States now has trade agreements. Table 5 relates to the countries with which such agreements were made before January 1, 1948 (the large majority of these agreements were made between 1934 and 1943); the countries are listed in the order of the dates at which the agreements entered into effect. In this table the preagreement period is distinguished from the postagreement period for each country, a single line being drawn across the columns if the agreement went into effect on January 1 of the given year and two lines being drawn where the agreement entered into effect during the course of the year and after January 1. For reasons set forth in the Summary (part I) most of the figures in this table throw little light on the effects of the trade agreements on trade. The most significant data from this point of view are those for the countries with which agreements were entered into between 1934 and 1936, and for the years immediately preceding and immediately following the dates of the respective agreements. The data for the war years furnish no basis for judgment as to the effects of any of the trade agreements, and in the data for the postwar years the effects of the agreements are largely or wholly obscured by other major causes affecting the trade.

Table 6 relates to the trade with the individual countries with which agreements were first made at Geneva (effective on or after Jan. 1, 1948 2/). Obviously this table cannot show any effects from these trade agreements, but the data are significant as indicating the

magnitude of the prewar, wartime, and postwar trade with these countries, the ratio of imports to exports in the trade with them, and the proportion of the total imports subject to duty.

Trade with principal individual nonagreement countries.—Table 7 shows the trade with principal individual countries with which the United States has no trade agreement.

Trade in principal duty-reduced articles.—Table 8 presents data for imports of the principal individual articles on which duties had been reduced in trade agreements which became effective before 1937. This table is the basis for a summary table in part I (table 9). It shows for each article the change in duty brought about by these early trade agreements and compares the average annual value of imports during 1933-35 with the corresponding value during 1937-39.

Note .- This table includes imports free of duty as an act of international courtesy and free of duty as emergency purchases of war material abroad by Government agencies; on the export side it includes merchandise shipments under lend-lease. The amount of trade in these three categories is shown, from 1941 to date in table 2.

The Tariff Act of 1930 transferred a number of commodities from the free list to the dutiable schedules and vice versa. The most important perhaps was the imposition of a duty on cattle hides. Similarly excise taxes were imposed in 1932 on certain imports of coal, copper, petroleum and lumber which had theretofore entered free of duty. The shifts in classification from free to dutiable, or vice versa, resulting from these statutes are reflected in the table. See particularly the creat increase in the proportion of dutiable imports from Venezuela in 1932 and thereafter.
