#### THE EIGHTEENTH QUARTERLY REPORT ON PROCESSED MUSHROOMS

#### HIGHLIGHTS

During the fourth quarter (October-December) 1983, compared with the same quarter 1982:

- APPARENT CONSUMPTION of canned mushrooms decreased 18 percent to 47.2 million pounds;
- DOMESTIC PRODUCTION rose 8 percent to 23.6 million pounds;
- SALES of domestic canned mushrooms declined 15 percent to 21.9 million pounds;
- PRODUCER ENDING INVENTORIES of canned mushrooms declined 25' percent to 12.0 million pounds;
- IMPORTS declined 32 percent to 17.8 million pounds, constituting 38 percent of consumption compared with 45 percent last year; and
- EXPORTS declined 66 percent to 35,000 pounds.

#### QUARTERLY STATISTICS

For the fourth quarter of 1983, compared with the same quarter a year earlier, apparent consumption, sales, ending inventories, imports, and exports of canned mushrooms all declined while production by domestic producers increased (see table 1). Ending inventories by producers totaled 12.0 million pounds (down 25 percent); sales by producers, 21.9 million pounds (down 15 percent); exports, 35,000 pounds (down 66 percent); imports, 17.8 million pounds (down 32 percent); and apparent consumption, 47.2 million pounds (down 18 percent). Domestic production totaled 23.6 million pounds (up 8 percent). Data were also collected for the second and third quarters of 1983 and are presented in table 2. For the second and third quarters of 1983, compared with the same quarters a year earlier, production, imports, and consumption rose steadily, sales rose during the second quarter before declining during the third, and stocks declined throughout both periods.

#### Sales

The decrease in sales of domestic canned mushrooms (15 percent) in the fourth quarter of 1983, compared with the same quarter of 1982, primarily reflected decreases in sales of retail-size containers of canned mushrooms; these decreases were accompanied by a smaller decline in sales of institutional-size containers. Sales of frozen mushrooms (7.5 million pounds) were 24 percent more than in the corresponding period of 1982. Sales of frozen mushrooms were equivalent to 34 percent of canned mushroom sales, up considerably from 24 percent in the same quarter of 1982. Exports continued to be negligible with respect to U.S. production and apparent consumption.

### Imports

The 32-percent decrease in imports of processed mushrooms in the fourth quarter of 1983, compared with the same quarter of 1982, reflects, in part, a decline in the domestic demand for canned mushrooms and an increase in the use of fresh and frozen mushrooms. Fourth quarter 1983 imports were equivalent to 38 percent of consumption, compared with 45 percent in the same quarter a year earlier.

Taiwan was the principal supplier of imported processed mushrooms in the fourth quarter of 1983. Other major suppliers of imported mushrooms were the People's Republic of China (China), Hong Kong, and the Republic of Korea (Korea). Between October-December 1982 and 1983, Taiwan's share of imports remained the same at 43 percent while China's decreased from 44 to 34 percent and Hong Kong's share rose slightly from 9 to 10 percent; Korea's share declined from 1 percent to less than 0.5 percent in the two quarters.

#### MARKET YEAR DATA

Production, ending inventories, and exports of processed mushrooms all declined for the most recent marketing year (July 1982-June 1983) compared with the preceding marketing year (1981/82), while sales, consumption, and imports rose. The ratio of imports to consumption was 49 percent in 1982/83, compared with 46 percent a year earlier. In 1982/83, China was the principal supplier of imported mushrooms, the position it also held in 1981/82.

# A REPORT OF CERTAIN QUARTERLY STATISTICS FOR PROCESSED MUSHROOMS FOR SPECIFIED PERIODS

(The information provided in this report was compiled by the United States International Trade Commission as requested by the President in accordance with section 332(g) of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. §1332(g)), in order to monitor import competition in the domestic market for processed mushrooms. Data included herein cover the stocks, production, and sales of U.S. producers of canned mushrooms, sales of U.S. processors of frozen mushrooms, imports under items 144.20 and 922.56 of the Tariff Schedules of the United States, exports, and apparent consumption.)
