HEAVYWEIGHT MOTORCYCLES: SELECTED ECONOMIC INDICATORS, SECOND QUARTER 1985

Report to the President on Investigation No. 332-164 Under Section 332 of the Tariff Act of 1930

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Highlights

The following are highlights of the economic data collected on the heavyweight motorcycle industry for the second quarter of 1985, compared with data collected for the second quarter of 1984. Since most data obtained by the Commission regarding the domestic heavyweight motorcycle industry are business confidential (even in the aggregate), little information concerning the domestic industry is available in the public report.

- O U.S. production of heavyweight motorcycles decreased to 24,970 units during April—June 1985 (table 1), and U.S. shipments of heavyweight motorcycles decreased to 22,858 units valued at \$93 million during the same period. In addition, inventories and exports also decreased during April—June 1985, compared with the corresponding period of 1984, while retail
- o The average net selling price for U.S.-produced heavyweight motorcycles increased from \$3,914 during April-June 1984, to \$4,215 during April-June 1985.
- O Total average employment decreased from 3,383 persons during April—June 1984, to 3,115 persons during April—June 1985, and total hours worked by production and related workers also decreased during the comparative periods.
- o Import shipments dropped from 30,227 units in April-June 1984, to 24,974 units in April-June 1985, or by 17 percent (table 2).
- O Retail sales of imported heavyweight motorcycles decreased from 44,596 units in April-June 1984, to 38,911 units in April-June 1985, or by 13 percent (table 3).
- o Inventories of imported heavyweight motorcycles decreased from 138,378 units as of June 30, 1984, to 101,748 units as of June 30, 1985, or by 26 percent (tables 4 and 5).
