HIGHLIGHTS

U.S. production.--Preliminary data indicate that production of nonrubber footwear during the third quarter of 1989 decreased by 8 percent compared with the corresponding period of 1988 to 52 million pairs, valued at \$1.1 billion. Production during January-September 1989 was down by 2 percent from the corresponding period of 1988, to 171 million pairs, valued at \$3 billion (table 1).

U.S. imports.¹--U.S. imports in the third quarter of 1989 declined by 3 percent from the year-earlier level to 226 million pairs, valued at \$2.1 billion. Imports in the first 9 months of 1989 were down by 8 percent, marking a continuation of the downward trend that began in the fourth quarter of 1987 (tables 3 and 4).

The ongoing shift in trade among suppliers continued in the third quarter of 1989, as the decline in imports from Taiwan and Korea, the major suppliers, was largely offset by the rapid growth in shipments from China and several other Asian sources. Imports from Taiwan in the quarter fell by 27 percent from the year-earlier level to 67 million pairs (valued at \$512 million) and those from Korea dropped by 4 percent to 53 million pairs (\$581 million), bringing their total decline during the January-September period to 24 and 16 percent, respectively. Imports from China in the third quarter of 1989 almost doubled from the year-earlier level to 41 million pairs (\$187 million). For the 9-month period, China, the third largest volume supplier, shipped 101 million pairs (\$388 million), representing an increase of 122 percent from the year-earlier level (tables 3-5).

U.S. imports of nonrubber footwear from the European Community (EC), whose member states together constitute the third largest source of imports in terms of value, declined by 1 percent in the third quarter to 14 million pairs. For the first 9 months of 1989, they fell by 9 percent to 53 million pairs (\$939 million). Italy and Spain are by far the largest EC suppliers, accounting for 90 percent of total EC shipments to the United States.

U.S. exports.--In the third quarter of 1989, exports totaled 4.2 million pairs, valued at \$57 million, representing a 25-percent decline from the year-earlier level. For the 9-month period, exports fell by 19 percent from the year-earlier level to 13 million pairs, valued at \$161 million (tables 13 and 14).

¹ Effective January 1, 1989, the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States (HTS) replaced the Tariff Schedules of the United States (TSUS) as the tariff code applicable to goods imported into the United States. The conversion of the TSUS into the HTS resulted in changes in the classification of certain footwear products, in which some footwear previously classified as nonrubber now falls within a rubber footwear category. Thus, the TSUS/HTS conversion will affect a comparison of changes in import levels between 1989 and preceding years. No corresponding changes were made to the domestic industry database as a result of the TSUS/HTS conversion.

Apparent U.S. consumption.--Preliminary data indicate that apparent consumption of nonrubber footwear in the third quarter of 1989 declined by 3 percent from the year-earlier level to 274 million pairs, valued at \$3.2 billion. During January-September 1989, the U.S. market totaled 806 million pairs (\$8 billion), a 7-percent decline from the year-earlier period (table 1).

Ratio of imports to consumption.--Preliminary data for the third quarter of 1989 show that imports' share of the U.S. nonrubber footwear market increased by 1 percentage point in quantity to 83 percent, but declined by 3 percentage points in value to 67 percent. For the 9-month period, imports' share of the market in terms of volume was 80 percent (table 1).


Prices.--The Producer Price Index and the Consumer Price Index for footwear in the third quarter of 1989, increased by 5 percent and 4 percent, respectively, from their year-earlier levels (table 2).

Employment.--Preliminary data show that the total number of persons employed in the U.S. nonrubber footwear industry during the third quarter of 1989 declined by 8 percent from the corresponding 1988 level to an average of 78,200 (table 2).


Rubber footwear.--Preliminary data indicate that, during the third quarter of 1989, U.S. production of footwear with fabric uppers and soles of rubber or plastics, including sneakers, joggers, and certain casual shoes, increased by 10 percent from the corresponding 1988 level to 18 million pairs. Imports, on the other hand, remained level at 38 million pairs. During January-September 1989, production of these shoes declined by 5 percent from the year-earlier level to 58 million pairs, whereas imports climbed by 29 percent to 153 million pairs (table 6).

Preliminary data show that U.S. production of protective footwear in the third quarter of 1989 increased by 24 percent to 4.1 million pairs. Imports also increased, growing by 6 percent to 3.3 million pairs. During January-September 1989, production of protective footwear totaled 12 million pairs, 2 percent below the year-earlier level. Imports fell by 13 percent to 6 million pairs (table 6).

Nonrubber footwear: Quantity of U.S. production, imports for consumption, and apparent consumption, by quarters, 1988-89




Nonrubber footwear: Value of U.S. producers' shipments, imports for consumption, and apparent consumption, by quarters, 1988-89


