PREFACE

On January 13, 1984, at the request of the Chairman of the Committee on Finance, U.S. Senate, and in accordance with the provisions of section 332(b) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. 1332(b)), the United States International Trade Commission instituted investigation No. 332-175, Rum: Annual Report on Selected Economic Indicators. The purpose of the report is to gather and compile data on the rum industry from public sources and report such data to the Committee on an annual basis.

The report, as requested by the Finance Committee, contains the following statistical information on rum: (1) U.S. production; (2) U.S. exports; (3) imports for consumption (total and by countries designated as eligible for the Caribbean Basin Initiative (CBI)); (4) apparent U.S. consumption; and (5) shipments from Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands to the United States.

The tenth annual report covers 1992 and 1993. Subsequent reports will be issued on a calendar-year basis as long as rum is accorded duty-free treatment pursuant to the Caribbean Basin Economic Recovery Act; the next report covering calendar year 1994 will be issued in 1995 as soon as data are available.

HIGHLIGHTS

The following are highlights of the economic data collected on rum for 1992 and 1993.

- During 1992-93, the quantity of U.S. rum production fell by 4 percent to 86.1 million proof liters. However, the value of U.S. rum production grew by approximately 17 percent to \$112.7 million because of an increase in unit value.
- The quantity of U.S. rum exports grew by 12 percent from 12.9 million proof liters in 1992, to 14.5 million proof liters in 1993, while the value of U.S. rum exports grew by 22 percent, from \$12.2 million in 1992, to \$14.9 million in 1993.
- U.S. rum imports increased in quantity by 30 percent from 6.1 million proof liters in 1992, to 8.0 million proof liters in 1993, while the value of U.S. rum imports grew by 22 percent, from \$10.3 million in 1992, to \$12.5 million in 1993.
- Rum imports from CBI eligible countries accounted for 85 percent of the value of total rum imports in 1992, and 86 percent in 1993. Rum imports from Jamaica alone represented 73 percent of the value of rum imports from all CBI eligible countries in 1992, and fell to 61 percent of such value in 1993.
- Apparent U.S. consumption of rum fell by 7 percent, during 1992-93, to 78.6 million proof liters. The import-to-consumption ratio grew to 10.1 percent in 1993, compared with 7.2 percent in 1992.
- Rum shipments from Puerto Rico to the United States declined by 6 percent from 71.9 million proof liters in 1992 to 67.4 million proof liters in 1993. During the same 2 years, rum shipments from the U.S. Virgin Islands to the United States declined by 14 percent to 6.9 million proof liters.
