## USITC PUBLISHES SEVENTH REPORT OF CERTAIN QUARTERLY STATISTICS FOR PROCESSED MUSHROOMS

The United States International Trade Commission has completed its seventh quarterly report on processed mushrooms. The report is made pursuant to a Presidential request dated March 10, 1977, and covers the marketing years 1976/77 and 1977/78, as well as the quarters July-September 1977 and 1978 and April-June 1978.

This report, which is sent to the Special Representative for Trade Negotiations, provides information for monitoring import competition in the U.S. market for processed mushrooms. It also contains data on the inventories, production, and sales of U.S. canners of mushrooms, by container size and style of pack; U.S. sales of frozen mushrooms; U.S. imports for consumption, by country of origin; U.S. exports; and apparent U.S. consumption.

Apparent U.S. consumption of processed mushrooms in the third quarter of 1978 amounted to 43.7 million pounds, down slightly from the 45.0million pounds consumed in the third quarter of 1977. U.S. imports continued to increase, reaching 23.3 million pounds during July-September 1978, an increase of 12 percent above the same quarter a year earlier. Imports supplied 53 percent of apparent consumption in the latest quarter, compared with 46 percent during the third quarter of 1977. U.S. production in the third quarter, the period of seasonally low output, was only 55 percent of that of April-June 1978, but was slightly higher than domestic output in the third quarter of 1977.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SEVENTH QUARTERLY REPORT ON PROCESSED MUSHROOMS

Apparent consumption of processed mushrooms in the third quarter of 1978 amounted to 43.7 million pounds (drained-weight basis), about 3 percent less than in the same quarter of 1977. Sales of the domestic canned product during July-September 1978, however, decreased to 18.9 million pounds, down 19 percent from a year earlier. Imports during the third quarter rose to 23.3 million pounds, an increase of 12 percent compared to the same quarter of 1977. A comparison of the ratio of imports to consumption reveals that imports increased their share of the domestic market to 53 percent in the 1978 period, compared with 46 percent in 1977.

U.S. production of canned mushrooms during July-September 1978 (14.7 million pounds) was slightly higher than in the third quarter of 1977.

Thus, carry-out stocks of canned mushrooms held by U.S. processors increased; on September 30, 1978, such stocks amounted to 17.1 million pounds, about 28 percent more than a year earlier.

The third quarter has traditionally been a period of low domestic production because most fresh mushrooms are grown during the period from October through May, when climatic conditions favor growth. Thus, domestic production of canned mushrooms in 1978 during the July-September period was only 55 percent of that in April-June. Although sales and stocks of the domestic product and imports all were lower in the third quarter of the year, as compared with those in the second quarter, imports continued to hold somewhat more than half of the market share.
