

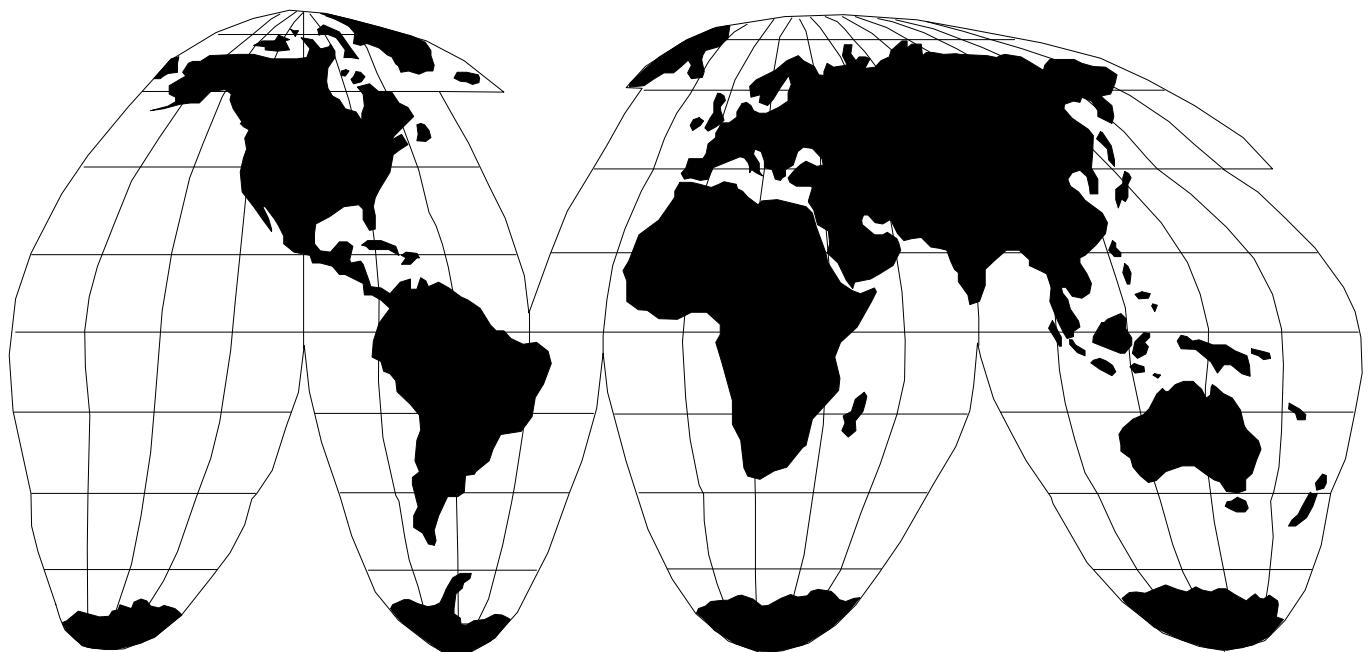

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Preface

Section 316 of the North American Free-Trade Agreement Implementation Act (NAFTA Implementation Act), Public Law 103-182, requires the U.S. International Trade Commission (Commission) to monitor U.S. imports of "fresh or chilled tomatoes" and "fresh or chilled peppers, other than chili peppers," until January 1, 2009. As a result, the Commission instituted investigation No. 332-350, Monitoring of U.S. Imports of Tomatoes, and investigation No. 332-351, Monitoring of U.S. Imports of Peppers, under section 332(g) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. 1332(g)). This report on the Commission's monitoring investigation covers peppers for fresh-market use and for processing. The purpose of this monitoring, as expressed in the NAFTA Implementation Act, is to permit the Commission to conduct an expedited investigation and, if appropriate, recommend to the President provisional relief should a petition for relief be filed under section 202 of the Trade Act of 1974 with respect to imports from all countries, or a petition requesting such relief be filed under section 302 of the NAFTA Implementation Act with respect to imports from Canada or Mexico. Generally, such provisional relief would remain in effect, pending completion of the investigation by the Commission and the taking of final action by the President.

Imports of fresh bell peppers (along with fresh tomatoes) were the subject of a Commission investigation in 1996 under section 202 of the Trade Act of 1974. Following the receipt of a petition on March 11, 1996, filed by the Florida Fruit and Vegetable Association, et al., the Commission instituted investigation No. TA-201-66. The Commission made a negative injury determination in that investigation on July 2, 1996, and accordingly no relief was provided. The petition did not request provisional relief. For additional information, see the Commission's report, *Fresh Tomatoes and Bell Peppers*, USITC publication 2985, August 1996.

This report contains statistical information gathered by the Commission on the U.S. pepper industry in the course of its monitoring. This information includes (1) consumption and trade data (including U.S. imports and U.S. exports) and (2) other industry data (including U.S. production quantity, value, unit value, harvested area; U.S. cost-of-production estimates; U.S. weekly arrivals and shipping point quantities; and average U.S. retail and shipper prices). The information presented in this report on the U.S. pepper industry was obtained from a number of sources, including the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Department of Commerce, and the University of Florida Cooperative Extension Service. This report principally covers 1993-97 data and partial-year data for 1998.¹

¹ Nothing in this report should be construed to indicate how the Commission would find in an investigation conducted under statutory authority covering the same or similar subject matter.

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Highlights

The following are highlights of the statistical data collected on all peppers, as well as on peppers for fresh-market use and processing.

Fresh-market Peppers

- ! Apparent U.S. consumption of fresh-market peppers rose by 22 percent in volume, and by 25 percent in value, from 646,277 metric tons valued at \$457.1 million in 1993, to 789,442 metric tons valued at \$571.1 million in 1997. In 1997, the ratio of imports to consumption by volume was 23 percent, up from 19 percent in 1993.
- ! U.S. production of fresh-market peppers rose by 16 percent from an estimated 579,920 metric tons (\$371.9 million) in 1993 to 670,920 metric tons (\$427.2 million) in 1997. Since 1993, the U.S. harvested area for peppers has trended upward slightly, with most of the increase accounted for by California acreage. California and Florida were the leading States in production during the 1993-97 period, with production in Florida harvested principally during Oct.-June and California production harvested mainly during May-November.
- ! U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers increased by 47 percent, in volume, from 121,948 metric tons in 1993 to 179,210 metric tons in 1997, and by 48 percent, in value, from \$133.9 million in 1993 to \$198.3 million in 1997. Mexico accounted for 82 percent by volume of total imports of fresh-market peppers in 1997. Other important foreign suppliers included the Netherlands and Canada. Imports from Mexico during January-April, the months when imports from Mexico are normally greatest, were up slightly in 1997 from the level in the corresponding 1996 period.
- ! During the 1995/96 to 1997/98 seasons, about 85 percent of U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers from Mexico entered through the Nogales, Arizona, customs district. Most of the remaining U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers entered through the San Diego, California, customs district. In recent years, most imports were entered during December through the following April.
- ! U.S. exports of fresh-market peppers rose from 55,591 metric tons in 1993 to 60,688 metric tons in 1997. The value of U.S. exports also rose during 1993-97. Canada has been the leading foreign market for U.S. fresh-market pepper exports in recent years, accounting for an increasing share of U.S. exports since 1993.
- ! Average U.S. monthly retail prices for fresh-market peppers have trended upward since 1993. In 1997, prices fluctuated from a low of \$1.19 per pound in January to a high of \$1.67 per pound in October and November. The highest prices are normally reported during the period November through February.

Processed Peppers

- ! U.S. production of processed peppers fell by 12 percent, in quantity, from an estimated 21,060 metric tons in 1993 to 18,521 metric tons in 1997. The value of production in 1997 was an estimated \$21.5 million, down by 14 percent from an estimated \$24.9 million in 1993.
- ! U.S. imports of processed peppers rose by 49 percent from 5,627 metric tons in 1993 to 8,371 metric tons in 1997, with an accompanying 46 percent rise in value of total imports from \$6.6 million in 1993 to \$9.7 million in 1997. Spain has been the leading source of processed peppers since 1993, supplying over four-fifths annually of imports by volume throughout the 1993-97 period.
