


Monitoring of U.S. Imports of Peppers

Investigation No. 332-351

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U.S. International Trade Commission

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Preface

Section 316 of the North American Free-Trade Agreement Implementation Act (NAFTA Implementation Act), Public Law 103-182, requires the U.S. International Trade Commission (Commission) to monitor U.S. imports of "fresh or chilled tomatoes" and "fresh or chilled peppers, other than chili peppers," until January 1, 2009. As a result, the Commission instituted investigation No. 332-350, Monitoring of U.S. Imports of Tomatoes, and investigation No. 332-351, Monitoring of U.S. Imports of Peppers, under section 332(g) of the Tariff Act of 1930 (19 U.S.C. 1332(g)). This report on the Commission's monitoring investigation covers peppers for fresh-market use and for processing. The purpose of this monitoring, as expressed in the NAFTA Implementation Act, is to permit the Commission to conduct an expedited investigation and, if appropriate, recommend to the President provisional relief should a petition for relief be filed under section 202 of the Trade Act of 1974 with respect to imports from all countries, or a petition requesting such relief be filed under section 302 of the NAFTA Implementation Act with respect to imports from Canada or Mexico. Generally, such provisional relief would remain in effect, pending completion of the investigation by the Commission and the taking of final action by the President.

This report contains statistical information gathered by the Commission on the U.S. pepper industry in the course of its monitoring. This information includes (1) consumption and trade data (including U.S. imports and U.S. exports) and (2) other industry data (including U.S. production quantity, value, unit value, and harvested area; U.S. cost-of-production estimates; U.S. weekly arrivals and shipping-point quantities; and average U.S. retail and shipping-point prices). The information presented in this report on the U.S. pepper industry was obtained from a number of sources, including the U.S. Department of Agriculture, the U.S. Department of Commerce, and the University of Florida Cooperative Extension Service. This report principally covers 1994-98 data and partial-year data for 1999.¹

¹ Nothing in this report should be construed to indicate how the Commission would find in an investigation conducted under statutory authority covering the same or similar subject matter.

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Highlights

The following are highlights of the statistical data collected on peppers for fresh-market use and processing for the period 1994-98.

Fresh-market Peppers

- ! Apparent U.S. consumption of fresh-market peppers rose by 16 percent in volume (27 percent in value) from 345,035 metric tons valued at \$487.1 million in 1994 to 400,732 metric tons valued at \$620.6 million in 1998. In 1998, the ratio of import volume to consumption was 50 percent, up from 34 percent in 1994.
- ! U.S. production of fresh-market peppers fell by 7 percent from an estimated 279,812 metric tons (\$387.8 million) in 1994 to 259,618 metric tons (\$410.7 million) in 1998. Unit values rose by 14 percent from \$1.39 per kilogram in 1994 to \$1.58 per kilogram in 1998. California and Florida were the leading States in production during the 1994-98 period. Since 1994, U.S. harvested area for peppers has trended downward, with most of the decrease accounted for by a drop in harvested acreage in Florida, New Jersey, North Carolina, and Texas.
- ! U.S. exports of fresh-market peppers rose irregularly from 53,375 metric tons in 1994 to 57,954 metric tons in 1998. The value of U.S. exports also rose during 1994-98. Canada has been the leading foreign market for U.S. fresh-market pepper exports in recent years, accounting for 98 percent by volume of U.S. exports in 1998.
- ! U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers increased by 68 percent from 118,598 metric tons in 1994 to 199,068 metric tons in 1998, and 82 percent, by value, from \$146.0 million in 1994 to \$265.5 million in 1998. Mexico accounted for 78 percent by volume of total imports of fresh-market peppers in 1998. Other important foreign suppliers included the Netherlands and Canada. U.S. imports from Canada and the Netherlands, although accounting for a small share of total imports in recent years, rose 305 and 23 percent, respectively, from 1994 to 1998. The bulk of imports from both countries are believed to be greenhouse-grown peppers. During 1994-98, the average unit value of imports fluctuated from a low of \$1.00 per kilogram in 1996 to a high of \$1.33 per kilogram in 1998.
- ! U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers from Mexico, entered on a June-May marketing-year basis, amounted to 154,802 metric tons in June 1998-May 1999, up by 2 percent from 151,041 metric tons in June 1997-May 1998. During the 1996/97 to 1998/99 seasons, about 85 percent of U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers from Mexico entered through the Nogales, AZ customs district. Most of the remaining U.S. imports of fresh-market peppers entered through the San Diego, CA customs district. In recent years, most imports were entered during December through the following May. Imports from

Mexico during January-April, the months when imports from Mexico are normally greatest, were down slightly in 1999 from the level in the corresponding 1998 months.

- ! Average U.S. monthly retail prices for fresh-market peppers have trended upward since 1994, amounting to \$1.53 per pound in 1998. In 1998, prices fluctuated from a low of \$1.19 per pound in September to a high of \$1.74 per pound in April. The highest prices are normally reported during the months of November through the following May.

Processed Peppers

- ! U.S. production of processed peppers fell slightly from an estimated 19,408 metric tons in 1994 to 19,323 metric tons in 1998. The value of production in 1998 was an estimated \$36.2 million, up by 6 percent from an estimated \$34.2 million in 1994. Unit values of processed peppers have trended upward since 1994.
- ! U.S. imports of processed peppers rose by 118 percent from 6,023 metric tons in 1994 to 13,147 metric tons in 1998, with an accompanying 108 percent rise in value of total imports from \$7.8 million in 1994 to \$16.2 million in 1998. Spain has been the leading source of processed peppers since 1994, supplying roughly four-fifths annually of import volume throughout the 1994-98 period.
