**NOTICE OF COMMISSION DETERMINATION NOT TO REVIEW AN INITIAL
DETERMINATION GRANTING AN UNOPPOSED MOTION TO TERMINATE THE
INVESTIGATION AS TO MERCURY CABLE & ENERGY, INC. BASED UPON A
CONSENT ORDER STIPULATION; ISSUANCE OF A CONSENT ORDER**

SUMMARY: Notice is hereby given that the U.S. International Trade Commission has determined not to review the presiding administrative law judge's ("ALJ") initial determination ("ID") (Order No. 9) granting an unopposed motion to terminate the investigation as to respondent Mercury Cable & Energy, Inc. of San Juan Capistrano, California ("Mercury") based upon a consent order stipulation and proposed consent order.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Commission instituted this investigation on May 16, 2016, based on a complaint filed by CTC Global Corporation, of Irvine, California ("CTC Global"). 81 *Fed. Reg.* 30340-41 (May 16, 2016). The complaint as amended alleges violations of section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. § 1337), in the importation into

the United States, the sale for importation, and the sale within the United States after importation of certain electrical conductor composite cores and components thereof by reason of infringement of certain claims of U.S. Patent No. 7,211,319 and U.S. Patent No. 7,368,162. The notice of investigation named as respondents, Shenzhen Zm Hesheng Power Development Co., Ltd. of Shenzhen, China and Mercury. The Office of Unfair Import Investigations is a party to the investigation.

On September 14, 2016, Mercury filed a motion to terminate the investigation as to Mercury based upon a consent order stipulation and proposed consent order. Mercury submitted a copy of the consent order stipulation, and stated that CTC Global does not oppose the motion. On September 20, 2016, the Commission investigative attorney filed a response in support of the motion. No other responses to the motion were filed.

On September 23, 2016, the ALJ issued the subject ID, granting the motion. The ALJ found that the consent order stipulation complies with the requirements of Commission Rule 210.21(c)(3) (19 C.F.R. § 210.21(c)(3)), and that terminating Mercury from the investigation would not be contrary to the public interest. None of the parties petitioned for review of the ID.

The Commission has determined not to review the ID and to issue a consent order.

The authority for the Commission's determination is contained in section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. § 1337), and in Part 210 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure (19 C.F.R. Part 210).
