

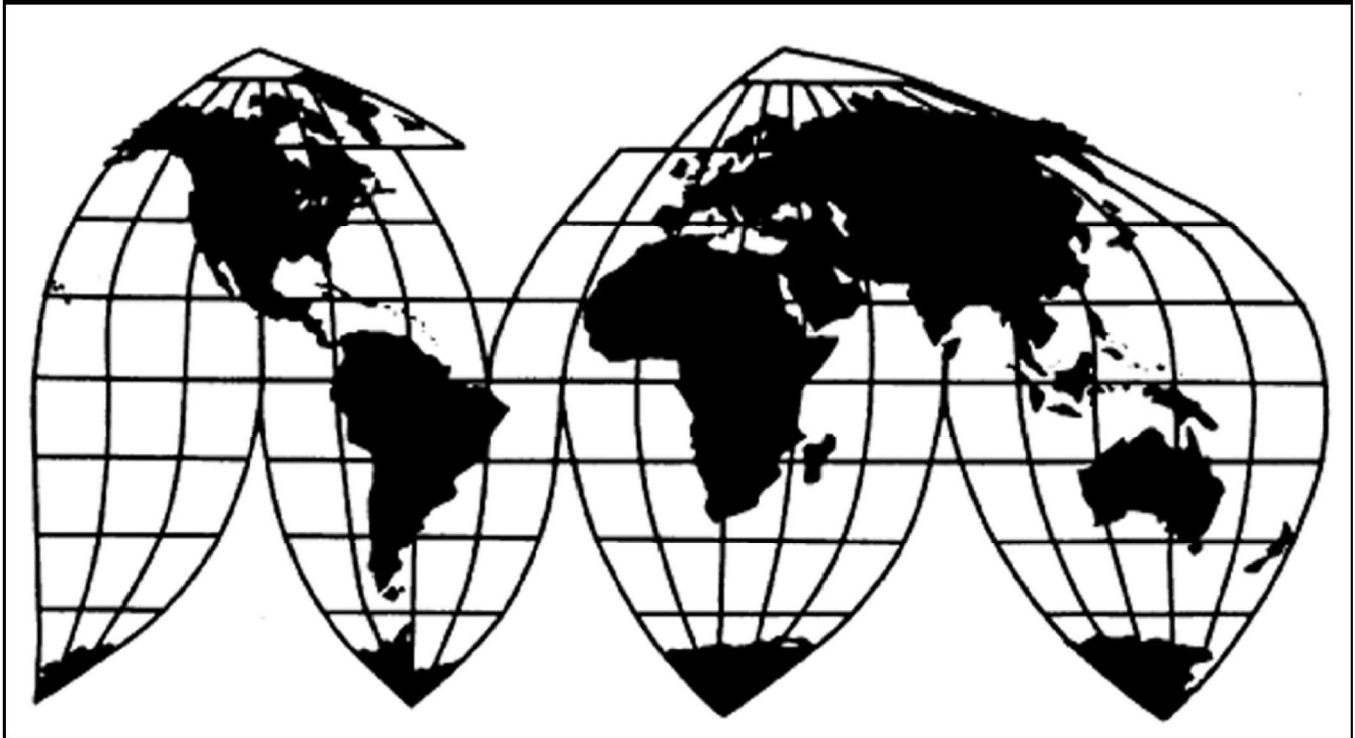

DETERMINATIONS

On the basis of the record¹ developed in the subject investigations, the United States International Trade Commission (“Commission”) determines, pursuant to the Tariff Act of 1930 (“the Act”), that an industry in the United States is materially injured by reason of imports of seamless carbon and alloy steel standard, line, and pressure pipe (“SSLP pipe”) from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine, provided for in subheadings 7304.19.10, 7304.19.50, 7304.31.60, 7304.39.00, 7304.51.50, 7304.59.60, and 7304.59.80 of the Harmonized Tariff Schedule of the United States, that have been found by the U.S. Department of Commerce (“Commerce”) to be sold in the United States at less than fair value (“LTFV”) and to be subsidized by the governments of Korea and Russia.²

BACKGROUND

The Commission instituted the antidumping and countervailing duty investigations effective July 8, 2020, following receipt of petitions filed with the Commission and Commerce by Vallourec Star, LP, Houston, Texas. The Commission established a general schedule for the conduct of the final phase of its investigations on SSLP pipe from the Czech Republic (“Czechia”), Korea, Russia, and Ukraine following notification of preliminary determinations by Commerce that imports of SSLP pipe from Korea and Russia were subsidized within the meaning of section 703(b) of the Act (19 U.S.C. 1671b(b)) and imports of SSLP pipe from Czechia were sold at LTFV within the meaning of 733(b) of the Act (19 U.S.C. 1673b(b)). Notice of the scheduling of the final phase of the Commission’s investigations and of a public hearing to be

held in connection therewith was given by posting copies of the notice in the Office of the Secretary, U.S. International Trade Commission, Washington, DC, and by publishing the notice in the *Federal Register* on December 31, 2020 (85 FR 86946). In light of the restrictions on access to the Commission building due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Commission conducted its hearing through written testimony and video conference on March 4, 2021. All persons who requested the opportunity were permitted to participate.

The investigation schedules became staggered when Commerce did not postpone its preliminary determination in the antidumping duty investigation with respect to Czechia (85 FR 83059, December 21, 2020). On April 19, 2021, the Commission issued a final affirmative determination in its antidumping duty investigation of SSLP pipe from Czechia (86 FR 21763). Following notification of final determinations by Commerce that imports of SSLP pipe from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine were being sold at LTFV within the meaning of section 735(a) of the Act (19 U.S.C. 1673d(a)), and subsidized by the governments of Korea and Russia within the meaning of section 705(a) of the Act (19 U.S.C. 1671d(a)), notice of the supplemental scheduling of the final phase of the Commission's antidumping and countervailing duty investigations was given by posting copies of the notice in the Office of the Secretary, U.S. International Trade Commission, Washington, DC, and by publishing the notice in the *Federal Register* of July 13, 2021 (86 FR 36772).

Views of the Commission

Based on the record in the final phase of these investigations, we determine that an industry in the United States is materially injured by reason of imports of seamless carbon and alloy steel standard, line, and pressure pipe (“SSLP pipe”) from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine found by the U.S. Department of Commerce (“Commerce”) to be sold in the United States at less than fair value (“LTFV”) and imports of SSLP pipe found by Commerce to be subsidized by the governments of Korea and Russia.

I. Background

The petitions in the antidumping duty and countervailing duty investigations of imports of SSLP pipe from Czech Republic (“Czechia”), Korea, Russia, and Ukraine were filed on July 8, 2020 by Vallourec Star, LP (“Vallourec”), a domestic producer of SSLP pipe. The investigation schedules became staggered, however, when Commerce: (i) aligned its countervailing duty determinations regarding subject imports from Korea and Russia with that of its corresponding antidumping duty investigations;¹ (ii) postponed the final determinations for its antidumping duty investigations regarding subject imports from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine;² and (iii) reached an earlier final antidumping duty determination concerning subject imports from Czechia (the “leading” investigation).³ This necessitated an earlier final determination by the Commission in the leading investigation. The Commission published its final affirmative determination regarding LTFV imports in the leading investigation on April 23, 2021.⁴

Subsequently, Commerce published its final affirmative determinations regarding subsidized and LTFV imports of SSLP pipe from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine (the “trailing” investigations) on July 2, 2021.⁵ As a result, the Commission must now make its determinations in the trailing investigations. Pursuant to the statutory provision on staggered investigations, the record for all subject investigations on subsidized and LTFV imports of SSLP pipe closed on March 25, 2021, except that Commerce’s final antidumping and countervailing duty determinations on SSLP Pipe from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine, and the parties’ final comments concerning those determinations have been added to the record.^{6 7}

II. Negligible Imports

Pursuant to Section 771(24) of the Tariff Act, imports from a subject country of merchandise corresponding to a domestic like product that account for less than 3 percent of all such merchandise imported into the United States during the most recent 12 months for which data are available preceding the filing of the petition shall generally be deemed negligible.⁸

During the 12-month period prior to the filing of the petitions (July 2019 through June 2020), subject imports of SSLP pipe from Korea accounted for *** percent of total imports of SSLP pipe, subject imports from Russia accounted for *** percent of total imports, and subject imports from Ukraine accounted for *** percent of total imports.⁹ Subject imports from all

three of the subject countries involved in the trailing investigations were not less than the three percent individual statutory negligibility threshold.¹⁰ Accordingly, we find that the subject imports from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine are not negligible.

III. Material Injury by Reason of Subject Imports

Section 771(7)(G)(iii) of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (“the Act”), provides that the Commission must make its material injury determination in the trailing investigations on the basis of the same record as that in the leading investigation regarding SSLP pipe, except to the extent discussed above.¹¹ Therefore, in these investigations, we adopt the findings and analyses from our determination and views regarding subject imports from the leading investigation with respect to the issues of domestic like product, domestic industry, cumulation, conditions of competition, and material injury by reason of cumulated subject imports.^{12 13}

Accordingly, we determine that an industry in the United States is materially injured by reason of subject imports of SSLP pipe from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine found by Commerce to be sold in the United States at LTFV and subject imports from Korea and Russia found by Commerce to be subsidized by the governments of Korea and Russia.

We have taken the magnitude of these dumping margins into account, as well as other factors affecting domestic prices, and they do not require modification of the analysis in *SSLP Pipe Leading Determination*. See *SSLP Pipe Leading Determination*, USITC Pub. 5183. Specifically, the dumping margins calculated by Commerce further supports our analysis of the price effects of the subject imports, particularly the significant underselling, loss of market share, and downward pressure on prices, as set out in *SSLP Pipe Leading Determination*; in turn, the price effects found in the leading determination are especially probative to our assessment of the impact of subject imports on the domestic industry. See *SSLP Pipe Leading Determination*, USITC Pub. 5183 at 45-55.

Part I: Background

These investigations result from petitions filed with the U.S. Department of Commerce (“Commerce”) and the U.S. International Trade Commission (“USITC” or “Commission”) by Vallourec Star, LP (“Vallourec”), Houston, Texas, on July 8, 2020, alleging that an industry in the United States is materially injured and threatened with material injury by reason of subsidized imports of seamless carbon and alloy steel standard, line, and pressure pipe (“seamless standard, line, and pressure pipe” or “SSLP pipe”)¹ by the Governments of Korea and Russia and less-than-fair-value (“LTFV”) imports of SSLP pipe from Czechia, Korea, Russia, and Ukraine. The following tabulation provides information relating to the background of these investigations.^{2 3}

No new information except for Commerce’s final determinations concerning seamless carbon and alloy steel standard, line, and pressure pipe from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine, and party comments thereon is included in the record for these proceedings.⁴

Subsidies

On July 2, 2021, Commerce published a notice in the *Federal Register* of its final affirmative determinations of countervailable subsidies for producers and exporters of product from Korea and Russia.⁵ Tables I-1 and I-2 present Commerce’s findings of subsidization of SSLP pipe in Korea and Russia.

Sales at LTFV

On July 2, 2021, Commerce published a notice in the *Federal Register* of its final determinations of sales at LTFV with respect to imports from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine.⁶ Tables I-3 through I-5 present Commerce’s dumping margins with respect to imports of product from Korea, Russia, and Ukraine.

Negligibility

The statute requires that an investigation be terminated without an injury determination if imports of the subject merchandise are found to be negligible.¹ Negligible imports are generally defined in the Act, as amended, as imports from a country of merchandise corresponding to a domestic like product where such imports account for less than 3 percent of the volume of all such merchandise imported into the United States in the most recent 12-month period for which data are available that precedes the filing of the petition or the initiation of the investigation. However, if there are imports of such merchandise from a number of countries subject to investigations initiated on the same day that individually account for less than 3 percent of the total volume of the subject merchandise, and if the imports from those countries collectively account for more than 7 percent of the volume of all such merchandise imported into the United States during the applicable 12-month period, then imports from such countries are deemed not to be negligible.² Table I-6 presents data on U.S. imports of SSLP pipe in the twelve months preceding the filing of the petitions (July 2019-June 2020).

Official import statistics were used for imports from Czechia, Korea, and Ukraine; imports of SSLP pipe as reported by *** were used for Russia.³
