SUMMARY: Notice is hereby given that the U.S. International Trade Commission has determined not to review the presiding administrative law judge's ("ALJ") initial determination ("ID") (Order No. 24), which terminated the investigation as to certain patent claims.

SUPPLEMENTARY INFORMATION: The Commission instituted this investigation on May 26, 2015, based on a complaint filed by Synaptics Incorporated of San Jose, California ("Synaptics"). 80 *Fed. Reg.* 30093 (May 26, 2015). The complaint alleged violations of section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. § 1337), in the importation into the United States, the sale for importation, or the sale within the United States after importation of certain touchscreen controllers and products containing the same by reason of infringement of certain claims of U.S. Patent Nos. 7,868,874 ("the '874 patent"); 8,338,724 ("the '724 patent); 8,558,811 ("the '811 patent"); and 8,952,916 ("the '916 patent"). The notice of investigation named as respondents Shenzhen Hiuding Technology Co., Ltd. a/k/a Shenzhen Goodix Technology Co.

Ltd., of Shenzhen, China; Goodix Technology Inc. of San Diego, California; and BLU Products, Inc. of Doral, Florida. The Office of Unfair Import Investigations was also named as a party.

On January 20, 2016, Synaptics filed an unopposed motion seeking partial termination of the investigation by withdrawing the following asserted patent claims: claims 11, 24, 26, and 56 of the '874 patent; claims 19 and 21 of the '724 patent; claims 4, 7, 11, 12, 16-18, and 23 of the '811 patent; and claims 2, 9, 13, and 14 of the '916 patent. *See* 19 C.F.R. § 210.21(a)(1). That same day, the ALJ granted the motion as the subject ID. Order No. 24 at 2. As a result of the ID, the following asserted claims remain within the scope of the investigation: claims 1, 5, 6, 25, 51, and 61 of the '874 patent; claims 1, 3, and 12 of the '724 patent; claim 3 of the '811 patent; and claims 1, 3, and 7 of the '916 patent.

No petitions for review of the ID were filed. The Commission has determined not to review the ID.

The authority for the Commission's determination is contained in section 337 of the Tariff Act of 1930, as amended (19 U.S.C. § 1337), and in Part 210 of the Commission's Rules of Practice and Procedure (19 C.F.R. Part 210).
